Library Gardens Update

September 2023

Overview

- September was a challenging month as our Evergreen transit system was still
 experiencing issues that impacted our physical circulation. Despite those challenging
 circumstances our circulation was only down 7%.
- As per our trends, electronic circulation was up 37% and helped our overall circulation grow by 9% for the month.
- Our programming and marketing team continues to drill down and focus our efforts on impactful offerings. Overall we offered only 33% more programs yet had 42% more attendance.
- Our IT team has been working hard to create a tech experience that meets and exceeds our patrons' expectations. They are in the process of rolling out new Windows-based patron machines while also exploring options to increase access to the internet and technology at home.

- Staff Development
 - Monique held the first of what will be monthly touch base meetings with the members of the Valpo management team. These have given each Team Lead the opportunity to share ideas, feedback, concerns, and questions. The information gleaned from this first round of meetings has been invaluable already. We look forward to continuing to learn from each other and improve our communication.
 - North County started staff training meetings this month. The goal of these training sessions is to go over the details of very specific work processes and allow staff to ask workflow-related questions. This month's topic was homebound delivery processing and digital professionalism.

Finance Notes

• The budget benchmark for the end of September is that 75% of the budget should

be spent. So far, 69.4% has been spent and we're on target to be within our estimated budget.

- The Library earned \$35,605.79 from Trust Indiana in September.
 - Included in the total interest earned is the Valpo Garden Donations, which earned \$841.15.
- During September, Hayley worked with our procurement vendor, Spendbridge on pricing
 for increased services that will continue to make the processing of accounts payable
 even more efficient. As PCPLS is one of the first libraries in the state to fully integrate
 with Spendbridge, we will be working with them in the coming year to create a case
 study to present at the annual ILF conference.
- Hayley and Jesse have engaged with an insurance firm to assess our risk regarding our non-employee benefit insurance areas. This will take place over the next few weeks.

Buildings, Grounds, and Technology

- The Kouts branch had a flood emergency at the start of the month. One of the family toilets in YS started to dump water into the YS area. Kouts staff, along with Jesse, Inge, and JJ, were able to get the flood stopped, contained, and cleaned up, losing only a few books and outlets to water damage. The entire team went above and beyond to minimize the disruption.
- Jesse met with the Portage team regarding the Portage Library Garden. While slightly behind at this point as a result of material delays and locating services, progress continues to be made.
- Jesse, Jason, and Sarah met to plan out features for the South Haven garden.
- Jason and Aiden have been moving shelving in the Valpo branch and cleaning out the basement for future development.

- Jason and Aiden have been doing tree and bush maintenance at the branches.
- Shambaugh finished repairs on the Kouts sprinkler system.
- Hebron's window that had rotted out was replaced this month. Now the study room window can be opened and closed.
- This month the Hebron library got its fascia repainted, giving the building a bit of a facelift. The painters did a phenomenal job. While conducting the repair they uncovered an issue with the copper that will need to be addressed.
- In September, IT was preparing the final steps to replace all our patron computers in October. These will all be Windows machines, which are much more familiar to the public and usually more relevant for the development of job skills. This is a big project that requires a lot of testing, but our team is well-prepared to carry this out!
- IT has also been working on getting our new incident reporting site ready to use. This will allow us to share information that is important for staff safety in a timely and efficient way. We should be ready to roll this out system-wide in November.

Public Relations and Marketing

- The total reach for social media and newsletters during August was 79,153.

- Jesse has been attending webinars regarding broadband equity and inclusion from various state agencies over the last month. He also met with Comcast to discuss options for further engagement at the local level.
- PCPLS partnered with the League of Women Voters of Porter County. Volunteers from the League came to each branch to help promote voter registration and inform patrons of the upcoming local elections.
- PCPLS was invited to have a booth at the South Shore Roller Derby bout in downtown Valpo this month. It was a fun day and the staff were able to talk with a lot of people, spreading the word about our upcoming Fall Fests and all the amazing services we offer.

- Did you know that there are several current and former PCPLS staff members in the local derby league?
- PCPLS once again was invited to participate in the Kouts Elementary School PTO Fall
 Fest. Staff were able to talk to a lot of families that didn't know about all the amazing
 programs and services that the library provides.
- PCPLS staff were thrilled to be invited again this year to the Kouts Elementary School Book Tasting. Dawn A., Amy K., and Cindi H. were able to introduce some tasty new books to very enthusiastic kids. It was a lot of fun.
- The System Programming Team installed a new story in the Valparaiso Rotary Library Garden in early September. The story featured this fall season is *Just Read* by author Lori Degman.
- Our Outreach team hosted a fun-filled booth at Portage's Bacon Fest, complete with a book sale area, raising funds for the Friends of the Library.
- At this year's Popcorn Fest, our booth was visited by thousands of people, and we had a
 fantastic time getting the word out about our annual Fall Fests and Fall Reading
 Challenge.
- The Annual PCPLS Fall Reading Challenge began on the 13th. This program is geared towards all ages and is run through our Beanstack app. In September, we have received 289 new registrations and 80 completions.
- At Valparaiso's World Cultural Festival, our Outreach team offered a craft encouraging patrons to paint a rock with a representation of themselves or their culture to later be featured on display in the Rotary Library Garden.
- PCPLS held the Fix-it-Fair at the Valparaiso Branch on the 23rd, in partnership with the Recycling & Waste Reduction District of Porter County. It was a fantastic turnout and many patrons were delighted to walk away with items repaired.
- The Annual PCPLS Fall Festivals began with South Haven on the 20th and Hebron on the 27th. The festivals included crafts, games, prizes, and more. We received food donations for these events from Casey's in Valparaiso and Casey's in Hebron. We were excited to have the Snowie Food Truck at South Haven. In Hebron, we had a Little Blue Truck Storytime with a special visit from an actual Blue Truck! We received wonderful feedback from patrons for both of the events.
- Ashley hosted a Library visit at the Opportunity Enterprises Respite House on the 28th, featuring an Introduction to the library and upcoming Fall Festival including a fall festival craft. This program is part of our once-a-month visit partnership with OE.

Youth and Teen Services

- Corine presented a new program at the Valpo branch called Science Kids, which is a super fun program for kids that are 9-12 years old. The kids have four stations to do experiments. At each Science Kids station, they explore all different kinds of science from Physics and Chemistry to Life Science. The stations change for each month's program. Even though the program is once a month, it offers the opportunity for fun new experiments without repetition and is adaptable to the seasons.
- The Valpo team worked together on a plan to expand its Book Babies program since it always has a long waitlist. We plan to offer this program twice on the same day starting

- in November. This will allow more patrons to attend while keeping the program size manageable.
- The Hebron branch recently started up a new Book Babies program. Hebron has a lot of patrons with very young children who will benefit greatly from the early childhood literacy activities that make up the new program, which includes reading, singing, and STEM-focused play.
- Hebron had an amazing turnout for their Tiny Foods teen program this month. Teens learned how to make bite-sized tasty treats and then had some silly fun with a 'tiny-hands' relay race and challenges.
- Lego Club in Kouts continues to be one of our biggest programs next to Mother Goose on the Loose. From super towers to future space cars, everyone created something amazing.
- The Hebron branch partnered this month with the Hebron Middle School and High School to display some of the amazing artwork created by students.

Adult Services

- Now that the adult nonfiction collection has been finished at the Valpo branch, the team
 is getting back into the routine of keeping the area clean and organized by keeping up
 on their shelf-reading and magazine maintenance.
- September was another display transition month at the Valpo branch. Allison and the team took down all the summer reading displays across the branch and replaced them with more seasonal scenes. Monique, with help from Courtney and Allison, tackled the stairwell landing creating a pumpkin patch. Allison brought back the singing critters for the lobby, and Nikki created a cute animal reading display in YS. Nikki and Allison worked with marketing to try out a new display approach utilizing the scanner and larger printer to create bigger backdrops/images. This route offers a lot more possibilities with display work across the branch!
- Portage's Senior Art Fair reception had over 80 attendees. We hosted 53 artists and their artwork throughout the month of September.
- With the big weeding and shifting projects mostly over in South County, the staff is
 focusing on shelf reading and maintaining the stacks. They are also still working with
 Tech Services on the CD genre project.
- It is time for fall in both South County branches. In preparation for the Fall Fests, staff went all out to decorate and make the branches feel like Autumn. Staff also made several fantastic displays celebrating Latinx Heritage.
- The South County team has worked really hard on the weeding and shifting projects in both buildings over the past month. Hebron has finished both weeding and shifting in YS and Adult Services. Kouts just has a bit more to go in the Non-Fiction section.
- The Valpo team continues to make progress on its collection-shifting goals. The Young
 Adult collection has now made its way to its new home! The Science Fiction/Fantasy
 collection has also been shifted to its final location. Next up for the team is to replace the
 shelving units near the public meeting rooms so that the Large Print collection can be
 moved.

 North County worked on genre label changes in the CD collection at both South Haven and Portage.

Collections

- High-low The Collections team has completed our addition of "high interest-low vocabulary" books to our young adult and children's collections. These materials are designed to assist struggling readers and those interested in fostering literacy skills among our younger patrons and are especially important to address reading skills gaps as a result of the pandemic.
- Axis360 Since joining the IDL consortium, the digital resource Libby has grown popular faster than expected. Due to this and Libby's ease of use for patrons and staff, we have sunsetted the Axis360 app whose use has been declining in recent years. This ensures that we can focus more on the growing patron demand for e-content. We are working towards the goal of reaching 100% purchasing of requested e-materials in 2024, and are excited by the prospect of satisfying the patron demand for the growing collection.
- Music CDs Our catalogers have made great strides in converting our CD collections to reflect music genres in a way that is more patron-friendly. Jackie has developed a plan and is mobilizing branch staff to retrofit materials, and this is now underway. This CD project is the Collection team's first step to genrefying our materials with the goal of creating a better experience and ease of understanding of our collections for our patrons.
- Equinox Reports Inge and Elizabeth continue to work in conjunction with Evergreen and Equinox to develop better reporting for our system. Most recently, Elizabeth worked 1-on-1 with Equinox to develop reports necessary for ensuring that our patron hold requests are fulfilled in a timely manner and that our financial team and Collections team are in sync in regard to invoices paid. This has helped smooth out our acquisition process to be more efficient and focused.
- InfoExpress Update PCPLS has been receiving regularly scheduled pickups and deliveries. There is still a backlog of materials, however, we see clear progress. Jackie and Elizabeth have been receiving updates from the State Library and communicating these updates with staff.

Genealogy

- We had a good visit with a patron who is a relative of Almira Fifield. She made some good connections with Steve Shook, Porter County Genweb administrator, and Kevin Pazour, County Historian. She was able to visit Old City Cemetery and walk around to find family burial sites. She lives in North Carolina and has done lots of research to get Almira a military cemetery marker, and possibly a state historical marker here.
- We were able to give suggestions to a patron who is dealing with two generations of adoptions.
- Another DAR tour occurred on Tuesday, 19 September. There were 10 attendees this time.
- Mondays are typically our busiest days. One week we had over ten patrons, all in the morning.

- Our team searched for records of a farm in Union Township for a couple who came here from Illinois.
- We collected photographs and memorabilia for the Gesse family that were sent by a descendant.
- Chris met with a Thune family descendant who came here for her high school reunion.
 She visited from Florida for a long weekend.
- Our team was excited to search for Popcorn Fest themes and was able to share those with the Valparaiso Events office. They discovered that we had more of a list than they did!
- We worked on a question from Valparaiso City Communications on the bricks used on Valparaiso Street. The bricks there were reused from Lincolnway about 1928.
- The team started researching 9 Franklin St. for the current owner. It appears to have been an early grocery store, then a restaurant, a men's clothing store, and a jewelry store.







